New to Ski for Light?

Here is Some Information for You!

Each year we have a number of new folks at Ski for Light who are unsure of what the week entails. Because some of us have been doing this for years, we take for granted that everyone else knows what to expect and for that we apologize. But if you are unsure of anything or need anything, please ask!! You will find we are a very accommodating group to be with.

Sunday is registration day. Everyone should go to the Mineral Palace between 2:00-5:00 to register. You will then turn in all the raffle tickets you sold, pay any balance due, find out which hotel and room you are assigned, receive a program which includes a schedule of events for the week, get a name tag, get banquet tickets and meal vouchers you've paid or qualify for or you may buy them there. There will also be SFL souvenirs for sale. At 5:00, there will be a wine and cheese meet and greet and at 7:00 there will be a new person orientation and Question & Answer session.

If you are a participant who signed up to Cross Country Ski: You will find out who your guide for the week is either on Sunday at registration or Monday at the cross country site. Check the schedule to find out when the bus leaves to go to the cross country site. On Monday, you will meet up with your guide, receive your equipment and then you are set to ski on the 1K and 5K trails. You will have a chance to sign up during the week for race day on Thursday. Races are finished by noon.

If you are a participant who signed up to snowshoe: you can go to the cross country site on Monday to be paired with your guide.

At the Cross Country site: there is a warming tent and lunch will be served everyday but Thursday in which you can go back to the Mineral Palace hotel and eat with a provided meal voucher, or, you may go to the downhill side at Terry Peak and eat lunch with a provided meal voucher and cheer on the downhill participants during their races.

If you are a participant who signed up to do both Cross Country and Downhill: you will find out who your guide is either on Sunday at registration or Monday at the cross country site. You signed up to Downhill: Visually impaired skiers will be assigned a guide for the week and will find out who your guide is on Monday morning at Terry Peak. Check the schedule to see when the bus leaves for the site. Your guide or a volunteer will help you get your equipment needed after you get a rental slip from the downhill coordinator. If you are a mobility impaired skier you will come to the site and sign up with the downhill coordinator for adaptive skis and wait until it's your turn to use the ski. You will have many different guides during the week. Race day for visually impaired stand-up skiers is Wednesday so sign up before then. Race day for physically impaired participants is Thursday so sign up before then. There is no recreational skiing for adaptive skiers on race day until all the races are finished.

At Terry Peak, the Downhill site: There will be two downhill coordinators. The inside coordinator will assign you a guide if you

are a visually impaired skier; adaptive skiers will get signed up for a turn on an adaptive ski and let you know when it's your turn. The outside coordinator will help you get your adaptive ski and guides. You will be provided meal vouchers every day from the SFL t-shirt table to eat lunch at the cafeteria.

If you are a volunteer who signed up to guide cross country: You will find out who you are assigned to guide for the week either Sunday night at registration or Monday at the cross country site. Check the schedule to see when you will meet for training on Monday morning at the site. We encourage you to help your participant out during the week, and help them sign up for races on Thursday.

If you are a volunteer who signed up to guide BOTH cross country and downhill: You will find out who you are assigned to guide for the week either Sunday night at registration or Monday at the cross country site. You will meet your participant on Monday morning at the cross country site and xc ski there for the day. You will meet your participant on the downhill side on Tuesday and help them get their equipment and ski there for the day. You will be expected to help your participant out during the week and get them signed up for DH races on Wednesday and XC races on Thursday.

If you are a volunteer who signed up to guide Downhill: You will meet on Monday morning at 8:30 AM at Terry Peak to help unload the trailer (and everyday thereafter) and then go through training for adaptive skiing and guiding visually impaired skier. Some of you will be assigned a visually impaired skier to guide for the week and you should make sure to help your participant get signed up for their race day on Wednesday. Some of you will be guiding participants in adaptive skis. Your day will consist of taking turns guiding different participants in different skis. There are usually 2 guides that will go with a participant in the adaptive ski, make 3 runs and return to see if the ski or guides are needed for another participant's turn. Please make sure the downhill coordinator knows that you are available to guide and wait for an assignment.

General Information: You may eat breakfast and supper wherever you choose in Deadwood but if you purchase or qualify for meal vouchers, they may only be used at The Gem Restaurant located in the Mineral Palace. They will have a breakfast buffet available every morning and supper, every night. On Monday night, we usually meet at the Saloon Number 10 for a free supper which is donated by a kind contributor of Ski for Light, but check your schedule to be sure.



The registration room at the Mineral Palace Hotel will be open most nights to any and all who would like a place to visit or play music and hang out. Check the schedule for available night.


Thank You to Our Dedicated Board Members

TSA Cares

ARE YOU CONCERNED ABOUT TRAVELING WITH A DISABILITY OR MEDICAL CONDITION?

TSA offers screening information and assistance to travelers upon request through TSA Cares at (855) 787-2227. TSA Cares is designed to assist travelers with disabilities and medical conditions and others who may need additional assistance with screening. TSA Cares is staffed, to provide travelers information on what to expect during the screening process, from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. ET, Monday through Friday, and from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. ET on weekends and holiday.



Through TSA Cares, a traveler may request the services of a TSA Passenger Support Specialist (PSS), who can provide assistance through security screening. A PSS is a TSA officer who has received specialized training, including how to effectively assist and communicate with individuals with disabilities or medical conditions; and travelers who need additional screening assistance. Requesting PSS service does not exempt you from security screening

Ms. Wheelchair America 2024



Editor's Note: Joseph Payette, affectionately known as "Uncle Joe" when he first attended the Black Hills Regional Ski for Light with his niece, Mariah Kilbourne, who won the title of Ms. Wheelchair America several years ago, was asked to be a judge at this year's Ms. Wheelchair America competition in August. His experience as a judge for this year's pageant is detailed below. Being a part of the competition further indicates our strong association with the national organization.

Ms. Wheelchair America started in 1972 with Dr Phillip Wood. It has continued the legacy with diverse titleholders and volunteers to empower, encourage and celebrate the unique abilities of all and help remove the barriers facing those with disabilities.



This year marks the 51st year of MWA. Eighteen state title holders gathered from across the country in Grand Rapids Michigan at the Amway Grand Plaza for a competition based on the advocacy of achievement, communication & presentation. A city of bridges, it is a wonderful clean and accessible metro

location allowing for the enjoyment of eateries, hotels, walks, parks, and museums by everyone.

I was invited and joined a representative from the Mary Free Bed Guild, Mobility Works and member of Team USA 2008 in judging an application, essay, two interview sessions and a platform speech by these 18 outstanding competitors. I witnessed women - mothers and daughters, authors and artists, teachers and students, born or later in life requiring the need of a wheelchair being free-spirited and orderly, poised and confident, motivated and determined, meeting new friends while expanding their abilities and readying to take on the world or at least their part of the world.

The judging led all to the stage where the top five finalists were recognized. These five each answered two questions from a judge. And there, in front of the crowning nights audience, once all scores were tabulated, Ms. Wheelchair America 2024 was announced - Ms. Wheelchair Maryland Chandra Smith. She now represents the other title holders and all of America. There were additional acknowledgements and awards for many and all, I believe, were better for this experience.

As I did when I introduced myself to the candidates, I say to Black Hills Ski for Light participants and volunteers – That I believe we all approach the 'day to day' a little differently. And if we can take some time to make another's approach more comfortable and enjoyable, we will better understand and respect each other. Enjoy the Day!

MS. WHEELCHAIR AMERICA 2024

Chandra Smith is an IT engineer currently serving the 508 IT accessibility team for the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA). She is a woman of faith, a poet by night, and a dreamer. With a passion for both elegant code and the power of words, Chandra finds beauty in the complexities of algorithms, just as she does in the cadence of a well-written verse.

Born to two disabled parents, Chandra was introduced to challenges and hardships at a tender age. Her father suffered four strokes by the time she was a teenager. Her mother passed away last year from Sarcoidosis, a debilitating lung disease. Her mother's battle with Sarcoidosis shaped her resilience and became her greatest inspiration.

Growing up in a low-income family, Chandra understood that education was her family's ticket out of poverty. She embraced this belief wholeheartedly, becoming a first-generation college graduate with not just one but three master's degrees.

With over a decade of experience in the intelligence field, Chandra's career has been nothing short of remarkable. Starting at the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), she worked as a Deloitte contractor before finding her place at the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA). Her journey at DIA started as just an IT engineer, but she soon found herself supporting the 508 office, a role she initially knew nothing about.

Determined to make a difference, Chandra immersed herself in the world of accessibility. She followed people with

disabilities and engaged with disability communities to expand her knowledge. Whenever possible, she championed the cause of accessibility, juggling multiple roles, including serving as the Vice President of DIA's chapter of BIG (Blacks in Government) and organizing the first-ever IT accessibility symposium at DIA.

However, life took an unexpected turn in the fall of 2021. Chandra's health deteriorated, leading to a hospitalization that would change her life forever. Faced with multi-organ failure, she was put on life-support, and the medication that saved her caused sepsis, resulting in three life-saving amputations. In a coma for three weeks, she also suffered a stroke that affected the mobility of her right hand, her only intact limb. But Chandra's fighting spirit prevailed.

Emerging from the hospital after a year and a day, including six months in a burn unit due to medical burns covering 25 percent of her body, she defied the odds and embraced a world that had drastically changed. Every staircase became a hurdle, every email a creative challenge, and every familiar place a new adventure. Yet, armed with her indomitable spirit, Chandra faced it all head-on and returned to work. Her resilience and determination did not go unnoticed.

A year after being released from the hospital, she was crowned Ms. Wheelchair American 2024, triumphing in a week-long disability advocacy competition. With this new title, Chandra's mission became clear: to spread awareness, promote advocacy, and change the world!

As a disability advocate, Chandra firmly believes that when we make things accessible for those with disabilities, the entire community benefits. She is committed to making digital content accessible to all, regardless of abilities. Her vision for the future is inclusivity and equality, where individuals with disabilities have the same opportunities and experiences as everyone else.

Chandra's story is not one of tragedy but of triumph and faith. She has overcome countless obstacles and continues to fight for a more inclusive society.





Eric was an excellent shot when he could get a tag. He partook in the Oahe Dam Deer Hunt as often as possible. Even with his injury, Eric was able to ski using adaptive equipment. He was a badass and could easily ski the black diamond slopes of the Rocky Mountains of Colorado.


On May 27th, 2017, he married his family. Erica, Benjamin, and Claudia became a part of his life, forever fulfilling his long-awaited dream of having a family. Family was everything to him; he always listened without judgment and offered advice as needed. Eric's love for his family, near and far, was never superseded. Eric enjoyed life and made the most of everything. All of his adventures led him to be a fantastic storyteller. The stories were always memorable and would illuminate his bright blue eyes. He was involved in mischief and mayhem before and after his injury (it was a miracle he survived as long as he did!). He enjoyed music and went to as many concerts as possible. Some of his favorites were Iron Maiden, Metallica, P!nk, Green Day, Motley Crue, Chris Stapleton, Eric Church, Allman Brothers Band, and numerous more. Eric was loved by all and will be greatly missed. We will miss his smile and his stories. Our memories of his life will live on.



Paul Gregory "Greg" Akrop, beloved brother and uncle, 74, of Deadwood and Terry Peak, passed away Monday, December 4, 2023 at Monument Health in Rapid City following a brief illness.

Greg was born September 24, 1949 at St. Joseph's Hospital in Deadwood, the third child of Paul John and Genevieve (Duchene) Akrop. He attended St. Ambrose Catholic School through eighth grade, and graduated from Deadwood High School in 1967. Due to the untimely death of his father in 1966, Greg opted to go to Black Hills State College to be able to be close to home and continue to operate the family business, Deadwood Granite and Marble Works. Following graduation from college, Greg was accepted into the South Dakota Highway Patrol and graduated from the Law Enforcement Academy in Pierre. He was assigned to Huron, but decided after a year that being near his home and helping run the family business with his brother, David, was a more pressing priority.

Skiing was Greg's lifelong passion. He learned to ski at Terry Peak at the age of six, participated in racing and ski jumping through high school, and served as a Snow Ranger for the Forest

Service at Terry Peak Ski Area during college. He served on the Board of Directors of Black Hills Chairlift Corporation and ultimately became the General Manager of the area in the 1980s. During his tenure as General Manager Terry Peak added a snowmaking system, opened several new ski runs, upgraded chairlift equipment and built a new chalet at the Stewart Slope base.

He retired as General Manager after the 1999-2000 ski season, but continued to live in the house he built near the ski area in 1979, and continued to ski at Terry Peak regularly.

Greg was a lifelong member of St. Ambrose Church. He was preceded in death by his parents, Paul and Genevieve Akrop. He is survived by his brother David Akrop, his sister Mary Ann (Bruce) Oberlander; nephew Michael (Angela) Oberlander and their twins Matthew and Sarah; nieces Lisa (Jason) Jorgenson and their children Genevieve, Andrew and Benjamin, and Julie (Jeremy) Gibbons and their children Luke and Jonathon. Having never married, Greg cherished his nieces and nephew and great-nieces and great-nephews as his own.

Being blessed with a strong entrepreneurial spirit and an astute business sense, Mr. Sampson took great pride in his philanthropic endeavors. He believed that his good fortune in life was truly a gift from God, and that to give back to those less fortunate was his primary duty. Or, as stated in one of his favorite quotes, "With great wealth comes great responsibility". Since his passing in 2007, the legacy of Mr. Sampson lives on through his wife



and two daughters bringing his philanthropic spirit into their own communities and charitable pursuits. His legacy, core beliefs, and values lie at the heart of the mission of The Sampson Family Foundation. The family and board remain committed to fulfilling the great philanthropic vision of the Foundation's founder.
